

Cindy Erickson Returns to Judge 2017 Hill 'N Hollow Quilters Quilt Show



Cindy Erickson of Omaha, Nebraska, will judge the Hill 'N Hollow Quilters Guild 2017 quilt show. The show will take place October 19-21, 2017 at the Baxter County Fairgrounds. Erickson judged the quilts hanging in the guild's 2011 show.

Erickson began quilting in 1985. Other interests and talents focus on clothes and interior designs. She has done commission work in home craft decorations and makes samples for fabric companies and magazines like Quiltmaker.

Erickson became a National Quilting Association certified quilt judge in 1998. She has judged for local and national shows around the country. Judging quilt shows requires talents in many areas and participation in guilds helps hone these skills. Erickson is active in national and state quilt guilds, and in 1999, co-chaired the National Quilting Association Show in Omaha, Nebraska.

She continues teaching classes and writing quilt books. In 2009, she was nominated for Teacher of the Year by Professional Quilter magazine. In Spring 2001, a pattern she co-authored with Jo Morton was featured on the cover of Keepsake Quilting Catalog.

Erickson knows what it feels like to have her own quilts judged. Her quilts have been shown in American Quilt Society, Houston Quilt Show, Paducah International Quilt Show and National Quilt Association.
