## **New Member!**

Donna Perrin, oldest of six siblings, lived in Texas and New Jersey as a child, but Mom and Dad moved the family to south Arkansas in 1969 and they've been in Arkansas ever since.

As long as she can remember, Donna has loved art and fabric in many forms. As a child, her grandmother allowed her to shop for fabrics for the jumpers she made for her. As a teen, she sometimes used her Mom's old Singer late into the night.

Years later, while her two children were at home, she made many of the family's clothes. To earn extra money, she took in alterations for women in the neighborhood later worked in the alterations department of a Little Rock boutique.

When the kids were teenagers, Donna decided to finish college, majoring in art. She landed a job in an ad agency as an intern before graduating. Within a few years, advertising art had changed to computer art — it seemed like it happened overnight. Without training in computer art, she was unprepared for the transition. She went back to school again, switched majors and finished her degree in biology. Not as strange as one might think.



Finding an opening at Arkansas Department of Parks and Tourism, she finally found her niche. In 1996 in that agency, she also met her current husband, Tony.

Donna's sister-in-law Nonnie, had a beautiful, hand quilted quilt displayed on her guest bed. She said she had taken a class and made it herself. That was the inspiration. Together,

they visited a quilt shop in Springfield, MO. The pattern chosen was a simple one by Northern Lights with dark cottons and black YLI hand quilting thread.

After that initial quilt Donna experimented with other methods. She loves quilts and quilting. Learning is lifelong — we never stop.

In twenty-three years with Arkansas Department of Parks & Tourism, Donna worked as park interpreter at Toltec Mounds State Park, state field interpreter, tourism division photography manager, and finally Tourism Development Manager for the state. Having traveled across Arkansas all of those years, Donna and her husband Tony knew that Arkansas's Ozarks were the place they would retire. They did so in 2016 — along with their two schnauzers.

After retirement, Donna joined a hand quilting group at Cedar Grove Church near Yellville. Although the group has dwindled in size, she has been part of that group ever since.

More Recipes from the Past

Apricot Nectar Salad

1 (8 Oz.) can crushed pineapple, undrained

Cup apricot nectar

1 (3 Oz.) pkg. apricot flavored Jello

1 (8 Oz.) cream cheese, cubed and softened

1 Cup shredded carrots

1 Cup chopped pecans or walnuts 1 Cup frozen whipped topping, thawed

Combine pineapple and apricot nectar in saucepan and bring to a boil. Add Jello, stirring until dissolved. Add cream cheese and stir until melted. Chill until consistency of unbeaten egg white. Fold in carrots, nuts and whipped topping. Pour into five-cup mold or 9-inch square dish. Chill until firm. Yield: 9-12 servings.

### · Vienna Coffee Cake

1/4 Cup butter

1/2 Cup milk

1-1/2 + 2 Tbs. cake flour, sifted

Cup sugar

1/4 Tsp. salt 2-3/4 Tsp. baking powder

2 Eggs

Topping: 1 Tbs. melted butter

3 Tsp. sugar

1/2 Cup chopped walnuts

Cream butter and sugar, add eggs, one at a time, and beat until light. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternating with milk starting and ending with flour, otherwise it will curdle. Pour into two 7-1/2x3-1/4x2-1/4 pans.

To top: Spread melted butter over batter, sprinkle with sugar and nuts and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. JoAnne Lehman

#### Hamburger Pizza Popover

1 Lb. ground beef

1 Med. onion, chopped

1/2 Tsp. salt

1 Pkg. (1-/12 oz.) dry spaghetti sauce mix 1 (15 Oz.) can tomato sauce

1/2 Cup water

Batter:

2 Eggs

1 Cup milk

1 Tbs. oil

Cup flour

1/2 Tsp. salt

Brown ground beef, onion and salt. Drain off any fat, then add spaghetti sauce mix, tomato sauce and water. Simmer 12 minutes. Then spoon into greased 9x13 pan. Top with one 6 oz. package mozzarella cheese. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove from oven. Pour batter over top and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 minutes more.

# **Hill N Hollow Guild Meeting Minutes**

May 12, 2023 The Guild Meeting started at 9:30 a.m. by President Rosita Forster recognizing visitors. Birthdays and Anniversaries were acknowledged. Birthday members received fabric cupcakes.

April Guild Minutes- Rosita reminded everyone the April minutes were on the Newsletter for members to review. Rosita asked if there were any questions or discussion. There was a question about the quilting that would be done by Ditsy Fish and the extra monies collected by the guild. Charity Beckley will credit two quilts to the guild for every ten quilts. The extra money collected by the guild will be used to buy batting for the Community Quilts. A copy of the contract is on the website. As a reminder, members do not have to use Ditsy Fish to quilt their community quilts, it is an available option. Community Quilts is currently out of batting but that is being resolved.

The question was asked if we needed to modify the minutes, but Peggy said it was on the website and no modification was needed. Randy Bolen moved to accept minutes; Ginger Alexander Seconded; all approved.

Treasurer's Report – Rosita shared that the April Treasurer's Report was posted on the website for members to look at. Treasurer Celine Kingsland could provide a hard copy if needed. No questions were asked. It will be filed for audit.

Announcements: Help Desk Available – Table was set up in back of meeting room. Vicki Kauth will be available to answer questions or be of help. She will find another member to answer questions she cannot. The newsletter had information regarding the Help Desk. Volunteers are welcome to help Vicki Kauth and written suggestions are also welcome at the help desk.

Community Quilt Contract with Ditsy Fish Clarification – The Contract is on Website and in the Newsletter. If you choose to use Ditsy Fish for quilting, please give Community Quilt Chairs the money or make your check out to Hill 'N Hollow Quilters Guild.

Quilters Mingle – is June 16th from 1-3pm at the Baxter Library. Information is on Website. Carol Lewis had RSVP/sign-up sheets available at the Guild Meeting sign-in table. The signup sheets are to let us know how many refreshments will be necessary. A question was asked as to what the Mingle is for and its purpose. There will be three rooms available with stations for the committees to meet and explain to people their roles in the guild. Officers will also be available to answer questions. There will be demonstrations of simple blocks, etc. and refreshments. The event is an opportunity to provide information about our Guild. Set up is at noon and take down after 3 p.m.

Members Teaching Members – Linda Langseth and Karen Walker were at the table handling questions and payments. Several classes remain open. Payments are needed for classes when you sign up.

Members Survey – Angie Lindberg stepped up to tell us about a survey she wants members to fill out on the health of our Guild. The survey will be sent out via email and placed on the website. Members are to print and bring the completed survey back next month for June Guild Meeting. Angie also reminded members that she is on the Fun and Games Committee of the Quilt Show. Her committee is looking for prize donations until September meeting. Some suggestions of games, goody bag items, baskets. Please get donations to Angie, Mary Jo Smith, or Kim Wallace.

Introduction of "Every Quilt Has a Story" – A suggestion was received that we add member stories each meeting after the great response to Sharon Crozier's presentation last month. The Board approved a submitted idea of having two "five Minute" presenters share their quilt and story at our monthly meeting. Picture Piecing Trunk Show – Callie Hargiss. Callie had a Workshop with some of our members the day before our Guild Meeting. It was an awesome class, and she was a great teacher! Callie and her husband, Charlie, live in Farmington, Missouri but she was originally from Idaho. They have lived in Missouri for 27 years. Picture Piecing was originally developed by Cynthia England from Texas. Callie teaches locally and travels for Cynthia England teaching Picture Piecing. Callie brought several of her quilts to show. She instructed us on how to do Picture Piecing. It was a very educational program with lots of examples to see. Several members of the guild walked around the room displaying her quilts. Callie had a table available for people to buy patterns, books, DVD's.

Show and Tell— Several of our members shared the projects they have been working on and their stories that went with them. They were displayed for us to look at. We have so many gifted members!
