Fiber Arts Boutique – October 13-14, 2003

The Fiber Arts Boutique will have tables to rent at the 2023 Quilt Show. They will be \$40.00 per table. You can partner with someone, and each person pays \$20.00. You also can rent more than one table. Each person will be responsible for setting up and stocking their own table.

The items sold must fall into one of the following categories:

- ► Fabric
- Quilted
- ≽ Piece
- Appliqué or Embroidered
- Quilter's Supplies: such as fabric, patterns, books, thread and notions. Pin cushions chatelaines, etc., or spool holders, quilt racks if they are handmade, etc.

Quilter's supplies are accepted at the discretion of the Fiber Arts Boutique Committee. It is each member's responsibility to secure permission to use and sell copyrighted or licensed patterns, designs, or fabric. Hill 'N Hollow Quilters Guild will not be responsible for any liability arising from unauthorized sales or copyright or licensing.

There will be a sign-up sheet at the July Hill 'N Hollow Quilt Guild meeting. You will need to pay for your table or tables when you sign up for it.

Enter YOUR Quilts Now!

Entry forms and rules for the guild's 2023 quilt show are available now on the guild's website. It will help the Quilt Show Committee continue planning the show if you begin entering guilts NOW rather than waiting for the last minute.

Remember: Friends don't make friends do extra work or scramble to get their work done! You can always enter more quilts later.

Registration Chair Donna Perrin distributed some copies at the June guild meeting, but two things have changed because intrepid, courageous guild members raised important issues with the Quilt Show Committee.

First, your total number of entries will be limited to 15 to ensure there is hanging space for quilts from all guild members. However, the category limits have been discarded. Those limited were holdovers from previous shows when we had 28 or more categories. SO if you want to enter 15 small quilts, for it!

Second, guild members voted last year to forego judging for this show in an effort to reduce the cost of the show and the number of volunteer hours required to make it go. This is disappointing to many who would like to have their quilts judged.

Some members have said they will hold their quilts for the next show in hopes of having them judged rather than entering them in the 2023 show. In response to this concern, the Quilt Show Committee has committed to allowing those who want their quilts judged at the Hill 'N Hollow show to <u>enter their quilts this year and then enter them in the next show</u> if there is a judge and quilt owners want those quilts judged.

So rather than holding these quilts for the next show and hoping for a judge, go ahead and enter them this year and have confidence you can have them judged during the next show (assuming there will be a next show and it will be judged).

Let's put on the top-notch show displaying lovely quilts that our visitors have come to expect and resolve to make the next show bigger, better and judged! - Vicki Kauth

Although Margie Dotson volunteered to make ribbons for us, Jonna is concerned we may not receive them. She has proposed a work session at the library to make backup ribbons using the prairie point star that Ann Wilson taught at last month's Sit & Sew. She will check available dates and let everyone know.

Jonna suggested we have a single spokesman for the committee who will make all announcements at guild meetings. Donna Perrin volunteered. Carol Lewis will back her up.

Carolyn Bisbee, a new guild member, been involved in quilt shows with her previous guild. She approached Jonna and asked if she could be a co-chair for the quilt show with an eye to chairing the next show. The committee agreed this was a terrific idea. Jonna will call Carolyn to confirm and will also ask her to be a backup committee spokesman at guild meetings.

A guild member asked if she could enter a quilt in the 2025 show if it was already completed but she was unable to get it into the 2023 show. The committee discussed it at length and agreed she could do so only if she had it judged in 2025. The group was not willing to make further concessions regarding 2023 entries being entered again in 2025.

Darlene Landrum will be scheduling guild members and vendors for demonstrations throughout the show. She plans to schedule one demo per hour.

Randy Bolen has arranged with Care Center Ministries for set-up to begin at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 11. He would like to provide a potluck meal for the Care Center workers and for guild members involved in activities that day. He has also scheduled tear-down with Care Center Ministries and would like to provide a potluck for that activity as well. The group clarified he will be handing the drapes since they must be installed before the top rails are put in place. Be sure to let him know soon how many tables and chairs will be needed for your show activity and how you would like them to be configured.

Mona Bolen will begin set-up of the Fiber Arts Boutique at 9 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 12. A number of guild members signed up at today's guild meeting to purchase tables. She will need an easel to support a sign for the boutique. She also said she'd like to wash the tablecloths because they smell musty — obviously, no one objected. ;-) She will get with Jonna to accomplish that.

Mona also shared feedback from a guild member who said she preferred the former arrangement of a percentage of sales going to the guild rather than the flat table fee, and arrangement of wares with merchants' wares intermingled in a visually appealing display rather the tables segregating each person's wares. Something to ponder for future shows.

Carol reported she has contracts with eight vendors and we have room for one more. She also suggested we prepare a timeline summarizing all quilt show activities so we are all on the same page. She will work with Jonna to do so.

Angie reported she has organized three "games" for the show: the ever-popular "Find that Quilt" competition, a challenge matching quilt block names with the blocks, and a "guess how many spools are in the jar" competition. There will be a daily prize for each game. She has collected quite a few prizes from local vendors and online stores and proposes to give a raffle ticket to every visitor and then draw hourly for prizes. Finally, she reported that The UPS Store charges significantly less for copies than That Print Shop and they are open on Saturday, so she plans to order contest material copies from The UPS Store. She will start with 900 copies of "Find that Quilt" sheets.

Carol reported that two visitors to Quilt Congress mistakenly thought they were coming to our quilt show and were very unhappy they could not attend the congress. Carol agreed to give each two free tickets to the show. Committee members agreed that was appropriate. This brought up a discussion about the policy for free entry to the show of guild members. The committee agreed to retain the current policy: Any guild member who volunteers four hours or more at the show gets in free.

Peggy reported she is on track for mounting displays at the library and The Sheid. She will be out of town over Labor Day weekend and will be unable to take down the displays, and she asked for help. Jonna will coordinate takedown. Peggy also reported that Merrilyn Scott will help with digital communications regarding the show.

Donna reported we received 70 entries today. Yay!

Sharon Crozier will be managing the database of entries and printing needed lists. <u>Please get your list requirements to her soon.</u>

Rosita Forster will coordinate entries from Maureen Forster's work for the memorial display at the show. Vicki will try to track down some of JoAnn Moore's work for the display.

Fundraising Raffle Quilt

Until 2007 raffles were illegal in Arkansas. So from 1984 until 2007 the Guild's fundraising quilt was called an Opportunity Quilt, as did all other quilt guilds. When the Arkansas Charitable Bingo and Raffle Rule 2007-4 became law, we were then legal to call it a Raffle Quilt.

Beginning in 1984 to the early to middle 1990's, members pieced the quilt blocks, set them into a quilt top, layered the quilt sandwich, hand quilted, bound, and labeled it. Sometime in the mid 1990's, Guild member Laura McBroom, was hired to hand quilt the fundraising quilt. Laura continued to do this until health issues made it impossible. I'm guessing it was sometime in the early 2000's the Guild began to hire machine quilting for the quilt. And, of course, the quilt was marketed by Guild members selling tickets.

Aren't we lucky these days? A committee of members usually makes the quilt, a machine quilter is hired to do the quilting. All we members have to do is sell the tickets. The funds received from the raffle quilt help the Guild finance its community quilts as well as helping fund quilt education by arranging speakers and workshops, etc. So, the more tickets we can sell the more batting we can purchase for community quilts, and the more professional speakers and workshop teachers we can hire. — Carol Lewis

Meet A Member

Carol Lewis and her husband Bernie were an avid outdoors couple back in Paso Robles, California. She worked for a CPA accountant, and Bernie was a structural iron worker. To get to hunting and fishing spots on the Colorado River, they got their pilots licenses! Carol, always the organizer, joined the LA 99s and championed several members to enter the Powder Puff Derby, a cross country race for female pilots. After retiring to Paso Robles, California for ten years, Bernie brought Carol to Norfolk, Arkansas in 1990 to continue his passion of hunting and fishing. Carol learned to cook every kind of wild animal and fish that Bernie caught.

Carol started sewing after she retired. She met Guild members Mary Bouras and Beverly Kirsch, at a local restaurant. They urged Carol to join Hill 'N Hollow Quilters Guild. Carol joined a year after moving to Arkansas in 1991, and by 1994, she stepped up to chair the quilt show. This was the first show to use both the entry room and the main room in the educational building at the fairgrounds, as well as the first time having vendors. During the late 90s, the guild membership was over 200! In 1994 over 1800 visited the free show. She was most proud of this accomplishment.

In 2005, she lost her husband and best friend. Over the years, Carol came up with recruiting, teaching, and using her accounting background to help keep the guild financially responsible. She developed several New Member events, including the latest Quilters Mingle that brought 97 attendees to learn more about our guild. She has been a fierce champion of keeping the guild fresh and inspired bringing in professional teachers like Ricki Timms and Judy Murray for Workshop 2000.

Carol urges those members who are new to quilting and the guild to just "enjoy what you do." Take beginners, intermediate, and advanced classes. For someone who didn't even start sewing until she retired, she has taught many free beginners classes. Her philosophy for learning is to take on challenging blocks that are made up of simple blocks like half square triangles. She believes this builds confidence. She helped me move from hand to machine piecing because of her encouragement. We have a living treasure in Carol.

HILL N HOLLOW GUILD MEETING MINUTES - July 14, 2023

CALL TO ORDER - 9:35 AM

IN ATTENDANCE: 58 guild members and 1 new member

WELCOME:

- A) President Rosita Forster welcomed guild members to the meeting. President Forster recognized one new member Carol "Cookie" Ische welcoming her to the guild. There were no visitors in attendance at this meeting. Birthdays and anniversaries were acknowledged. Fabric birthday cupcakes were handed out to July birthday members.
- B) President Forster stated that a suggestion was made to have Show N Tell quilts placed on the last two rows of chairs for members to view prior to the "parade of quilts" which would allow members better viewing opportunities. She indicated that members still needed to sign in their Show N Tell quilts each month.
- C) President Forster also stated that the hospital thanked guild members for their generous donations of community quilts.

WHAT'S WHAT:

- A) <u>Challenge Bags</u>: President Forster reminded and encouraged members to submit their Challenge Bags for the "Into the Light" organization which are due at the September meeting. These Challenge Bags will also be displayed at the quilt show in October. President Forster stated that the Challenge bags will be donated directly to the "Into the Light" organization after the October quilt show.
- B) <u>Newsletter Articles</u>: President Forster stated that Newsletter Articles should not be submitted in PDF format to facilitate editing.
- C) Help Desk and Suggestion Box "Harriet": President Forster announced that these tables are set up for members.
- D) <u>Education Members Teaching Members</u>: President Forster indicated that the August 11th class has only 8 people signed up. In order to have this class, 10 sign-ups are needed. The September 8th class only has 3 people signed up.
- E) <u>Sit N Sew</u>: President Forster stated that the next Sit N Sew will be held on Tuesday, July 18th and encouraged members to sign up. The "Sweet Treat Bag" will be the class given. However, if members prefer, they can bring their own sewing projects instead. President Forster stated that last month 20 members participated and encouraged members to fellowship with other guild members.
- F) Raffle Quilt Tickets: The next community outreach to sell quilt raffle tickets will be held on August 5th at Farmers Market, followed by August 19th at the James A. Gaston Visitor Center in Bull Shoals from 11 AM -3 PM and then August 24th-26th at the Baxter County Fair. President Forster encouraged members to sign up to man the table to sell quilt tickets.
- G) **Quilt Show Table with All Forms**: Jonna Butler, Quilt Show Chairperson, has all the forms available for registration, appraisals, flyers, bookmarks, and fiber art boutique.

Guild Volunteer Time Record

President Forster asked guild members to calculate their volunteer hours for the time period of July 31, 2022 through August 1, 2023. Hours need to be turned in at the August guild meeting so that the total number of hours can be turned in by September 1, 2023 to the Mountain Home City Clerk.

Quilt Show Registration and Rules

Donna Perrin reviewed the updated Registration and Rules. Questions were presented and Donna stated more discussion was needed. There is a Quilt Show Chair Committee meeting following today's guild meeting in regard to judging quilts at the October 2023 quilt show.

Quilt Show Fiber Art Boutique

Mona Bolen briefly reviewed what each participant needs to do for the "boutique sale". Tables are \$40.00 each with payment made at the time of table reservation. Sign-ups are available. Items eligible for sale are sewing and quilt related items. Identifying numbers will be given to each participant. The proceeds will go directly to the boutique which will then release funds to the identifying participant after the show.

Program and Guild Survey Results:

"Characteristics of a Healthy Quilt Guild and How Hill N Hollow Can Benefit"

President Elect Angie Lindberg gave a wonderful presentation on how Hill N Hollow can continue to grow and be a "healthy quilt guild" into the future. She went through step by step the results of the survey by the guild members and gave examples. A theme that was stitched throughout her presentation was to remember to be inclusive and kind to all guild members so that the guild will continue to grow for present and future generations of quilters.

Special Recognition by Sharry Neumann:

Sherry Neumann recognized Carol Lewis for all the mentoring, hard work and dedication that she has given to the guild and its members. Many other members of the guild expressed their love and appreciation for Carol as well. A special thank you cake was available to enjoy in the Community Room.
