The Quilt Show will be here before you know it! Here are some key points to remember:

Contact Peggy Moody for fliers and bookmarks to distribute on your rounds of shopping, hair, pedicure, medical appointments. Let's make sure the community knows the Autumn in the Ozarks quilt show is back with lots to see and enjoy!

If you haven't signed up to help at the quilt show, contact Jonna Butler at 870-676-9331 or Carolyn Bisbee at 281-380-2226. They can tell you where help is needed and get you signed up. Remember, you must volunteer at least four hours during the show (Wednesday, Oct. 11, through Monday, Oct. 16) to get free admission. Otherwise, you are a paying guest. When you check in to work at the show, be sure to sign in. You will receive a ticket for the hourly door prize drawing!

Remember to bring your entries to the fairgrounds 9 to 11 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 11. You will draw your turn-back number at turn-in, so be sure to hang onto it. Turn-back will begin at 5 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 14. The Viewers' Choice winner will get turn-back #1; the Members' Choice winner will get #2! Remember, you must have the yellow copy of your registration confirmation to get your quilt

back. Please remember to put the pink confirmation slip for each entry in a plastic bag and pin it to the bottom right corner of your quilt (back side). It will be helpful if your name is facing up.

Speaking of awards, voting will end at 3 p.m. Saturday and award winners will be announced at 3:30.

Bring your quilt shopping list to with you to the quilt show! We have some interesting vendors, some who have been with us before and some new ones. They should give you the opportunity to find your needs and wants.

Mona Bolen and her crew will have lots of goodies in the Fiber Arts Boutique. Your shopping list will come in handy here. Check it out! If you have reserved a table in the Fiber Arts Boutique, bring your wares to the fairgrounds to set up your table beginning at 9:30 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 14. HILL 'N HOLLOW GUILD MEETING MINUTES September 8, 2023

I. CALL TO ORDER – 9:30 AM

*** President-Elect Angela Lindberg led today's meeting as President Rosita Forster was not in attendance.

II. IN ATTENDANCE: 52 guild members

III. WELCOME:

A) President-Elect Angela Lindberg welcomed guild members to the meeting. She recognized three visitors that were in attendance. Birthdays and anniversaries were acknowledged. There were 4 birthdays and numerous wedding anniversaries recognized during the month of September. Fabric birthday cupcakes were handed out to September birthday members.

IV. BUSINESS REPORTS:

APPROVAL-

***President-Elect Angela Lindberg stated that the August 2023 Guild Meeting Minutes did not get published due to staffing shortages._

Treasurer's Reports

A. President-Elect Lindberg indicated that the Treasurer's Reports for the months of July and August will be submitted to audit.

Harriet Suggestion Box Ideas

A. President-Elect Lindberg stated that a Harriet Suggestion Box Idea that was submitted was a 40th Anniversary Pin for the Hill N Hollow guild members. President-Elect Lindberg indicated that the 40th Anniversary Pin was discussed at the Board Meeting on September 5, 2023 and the cost was not budgeted for. Discussion was then open to the guild members. This discussion centered around the cost of the pins (depending on the company that would be used and the

amount ordered) and if individual guild members were interested enough to purchase their own pins.

V. WHAT'S WHAT:

- A) <u>Baxter County Fair 2023 "Best Workmanship" Ribbon</u>: President-Elect Lindberg introduced and congratulated Sandy Nelson who won the Best Workmanship Ribbon at the Baxter County Fair this year. This beautiful quilt was hand appliqued by Sandy Nelson. President-Elect Lindberg invited her to submit her quilt to our October 2023 Quilt Show. Carol stated that this quilt was a work of love for her. A check was presented to her by President-Elect Lindberg prior to this presentation.
- B) <u>Challenge Bags for Into the Light Organization</u>: President-Elect Lindberg stated that these bags are due today, September 8, 2023. These bags will be displayed at the quilt show in October. Some guild members made more than one bag. Diane Siddens, Challenge Chair, then got up and spoke stating that she picked out some of her favorites of the bags. These bags are on display in the back. Guild members are encouraged to vote for their favorite and the "winners" will be announced towards the end of the meeting.
- C) <u>Help Desk</u>: President-Elect Lindberg reminded everyone that the Help Desk is in the back of the auditorium and Vicki Kauth would be happy to answer any questions that members might have. She also reiterated that if you are having a sewing machine problem that it would be most helpful to bring your sewing manual as well as your sewing machine.
- D) <u>Branson Retreat</u>: President-Elect Lindberg stated that this retreat is scheduled for March 4th-7th 2024 in Branson, MO. She indicated that Freida Mauthe has registration forms available if you are interested in attending.
- E) <u>Sit N Sew Update</u>: President-Elect Lindberg indicated that the Sit N Sew was a three-month trial to see if guild members were interested in supporting this activity. The Sit N Sews were held in June, July and August. Attendance went down throughout the three-month trial. President-Elect Lindberg indicated that this was discussed during the Board Meeting. It was brought up that perhaps a reason for attendance not being as strong is because it was held during the summer months and guild members may be on vacation. President-Elect Lindberg stated that there are no more Sit N Sews scheduled for the rest of 2023. However, the Sit N Sews will be re-visited next year for further discussion. Ann Wilson stated that a possible event could be held after the November Guild Meeting to make Lollipops taught by Sharon Crozier (Members Teaching Members) which is all hand work. President-Elect Lindberg stated that this should be brought to the attention of the Board Meeting in October.
- F) Raffle Quilt Tickets: President-Elect Lindberg stated that sales are slow. To date just over \$2,000.00 has been raised. Freida Mauthe stated that there are only three events left to sell tickets which are a local church event, Holiday Gifts at Stone Creek in November and our Quilt Show in October. Both Frieda Mauthe and President-Elect Lindberg encouraged members to volunteer to sell quilt tickets at these events.

G) **2024 Slate of Proposed Officers:** President-Elect Lindberg indicated that positions need to be filled for 2024. She stated that her theme for 2024 is "Fun, Friendship and Growth". President-Elect stated that a list of open positions and sign-up sheets are available and displayed in the Welcome Area. President-Elect Lindberg also stated and encouraged individuals to sign up as a team.

H) Quilt Show Announcements:

- 1. Donna Perrin reported that there are 250 registered quilts for the quilt show.
- 2. Carol Lewis has slated nine vendors for the quilt show.
- 3. Eileen Bing has eleven quilt appraisals registered, but in order for the appraiser to do our show twenty quilt appraisals have to be signed up.
- 4. President-Elect Lindberg reminded guild members that in order to get in free to the quilt show you need to volunteer 4 hours.
- 5. Vicki Kauth did a brief overview of how the quilt show is going to work and what is needed in volunteers to make the quilt show a success. Her overview included a description of hiring the Care Center Ministries for the heavy lifting for the set up and tear down of the quilt show, an easy way of hanging quilts which doesn't require climbing a ladder, quilt turn in and turn back, hospitality volunteers answering questions of quilt show attendees and reminding visitors not to touch the quilts, the Fiber Arts Boutique that each person is responsible for selling their own products but a central cashier will be provided, selling raffle quilt tickets and the quilt appraisals. Also, two volunteers need to sign up to sell raffle quilt tickets at the quilt show, need more volunteers to hang quilts at the quilt show, more 15–20-minute demonstration volunteers are needed at the quilt show and more floaters to work the quilt show.
- VI. <u>PROGRAM-MY QUILTING JOURNEY BY MERRILYN SCOTT</u>: Merrilyn Scott gave a wonderful visual presentation on the many quilts that she has made over her lifetime and how geographic regions in which she has lived and lives (California, Kentucky and Arkansas) and the time period (popular colors and styles) in which these quilts were made played a part in their creation.

EVERY QUILT HAS A STORY PRESENTATION: Vicki Kauth gave a presentation on how the Rocky Mountain Quilt Museum and their fabric line in Colorado influenced her beautiful quilts. Vicki stated that she entered one of these quilts in a quilt show in Little Rock, Arkansas and won 3rd place! Vicki stated that every quilt that you make teaches you something.

VIIII. Community Quilt Parade:

A) Eleven quilts were presented to give to our local community for those in need. The Snoopy Quilt was brought up because of its popularity at one of the quilt raffle ticket selling events. It was asked who made this quilt at the guild meeting. The maker of this quilt was not discovered nor where you could get the quilt panel. The reason that this was brought up was

that perhaps a few more of these quilts could be made and it would be a good money maker for the guild. Vicki Kauth suggested checking with Remember Me Quilt Store in Mountain Home.

X. Door Prizes & 50/50 Drawing:

A) Door prizes were won by Sandy Nelson and Arlene Myslinski. The 50/50 prize in the amount of \$15.50 was won by Ann Wilson. Always fun and exciting to win!

XI. <u>Challenge Bag Results:</u>

A) Diane Siddens announced the Challenge Bag Winners. 3^{rd} Place-Carol Lewis with Bag #7, 2^{nd} Place-Sharon Crozier with Bag #16 and 1^{st} Place-Donna Perrin with bag #17. Congratulations to all!

Christmas Lollipop Ornaments

It was decided, at the last minute, during the September meeting that I would demo how to make the Christmas Lollipop Ornaments after the November quilt meeting. I was not prepared at that time, so I'm sending out this notice to those who want to take part in the demo.

If you want to attend email me so I will have enough supplies: smcrozier42@gmail.com

Supplies you will need to bring.

- 1. A fat quarter or a least a 10" square of (red or green stripe fabric)
- 2. Two ½" or 5/8" buttons (red or green)
- 3. 8" piece of 3/8" wide ribbon to match the color of your fabric
- 4. Hand sewing needle and white thread, and an old-fashioned needle threader or a small crochet hook.
- 5. Scissors, rotary cutter & 6 x 12 ruler
- 6. Aleen's Tacky Glue (I will save some if you don't have this)

I will supply the cardboard & Popsicle sticks. I will also have extra glue & needle threaders.
