Raffle Quilt: This year's raffle quilt will be presented in March.

Fundraising Committee: A new fundraising committee will be forming to brainstorm additional ways to bring in more funds (bake sales, benefit night at Twin Lakes Playhouse, etc.). Please see Angie Lindberg or Carol Lewis for more information.

Potential Opportunity: The Ozark Regional Arts Counsel contacted Peggy Moody about having another show this year on the ASUMH campus at the Sheid. If we do this, we will need a committee. Peggy will be the contact person. There are no specifics available yet.

Challenge Quilt: There are 6 ideas for challenge quilt options available in the January newsletter. This was tabled for next meeting.

New Education Chair: Jonna Butler informed the guild of the first homeschool quilt group class which started yesterday, January 11, 2024. This class will run for 13-weeks from 1-3pm, at the River Church. Yesterday, there were nine students from 6 to 14 years old. More volunteers are needed. A request was made for more donated fabric, scraps, thread, batting, and neckties. Peggy Moody inquired about possibly putting their syllabus on our website.

Members Teaching Members: Jonna Butler is taking signups for February and March.

Raffle Quilt Committee: Carol Bisbee and Patti Kratz have formed this committee already, and it has been decided to be selective regarding venues this year (which is why fundraising ideas are needed).

Program: Darlene Landrum presented an interesting and informative program titled, "Seeing Through the Quilt Judge's Eyes," describing how a certified judge navigates the task of judging quilts, i.e., assessing general appearances, elements of design (like color, value, balance, rhythm), workmanship, consistency of piecing, sashings, stitches, points, etc. Darlene offered

reasons why entering a quilt into a show or county fair could be a fun experience where you learn your strengths/weaknesses, get a boost in confidence, and gain artistic encouragement.

Every Quilt Tells a Story: Donna Perrin and Judith Ericksen shared their stories and showed their beautiful quilts.

Community Quilts Parade: Six quilts were shown on parade.

Winners: \$11.50 was won by Peggy Moody in the 50/50 drawing. Door prizes of fat quarters were won by Donna Armstrong and Donna Perrin.

INTERESTED IN FREE MOTION QUILTING? – Vicki Kauth

Many of you know that I have attended the Empty Spools Quilt Retreat in California. One of my Empty Spools instructors, Jenny Lyon, will be teaching a number of classes at the American Quilters Society quilt show in Branson. I highly recommend her classes on free motion quilting using a domestic machine. They range from a full-day class ("Yes, You CAN Free Motion Quilt", 8:30 to 4:30 Wednesday, March 13, \$125 for non-AQS members) to a couple of half-day classes teaching specific techniques (\$70 for non-AQS members).

I took the four-day version of "Yes, You CAN Free Motion Quilt" and found her to be excellent, approachable, humorous and just plain fun. She uses lecture, demo and "plactice" (play+practice) to start you on your free motion journey.

Look over the list in last month's newsletter, think hard on what will get you motivated to join in the Challenge and be ready to vote February 9th.



MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

My Whole Life Has Been Charmed.

Dick was born 1930 in the southernmost Cajun swamps of Louisiana. They spoke Creole French there and still do. He was the oldest and cared for his 3 sisters due to maternal health.

As early as age 7, he expressed interest in fashion in catalogs and by 12, started hand-stitching alterations with family clothes. By 16, he got his first treadle sewing machine and got



permission to take Home Economics by the other student's parents. Imagine the gender norms working against him but overcame them. He loved the 20 years spent there.

In 1950, as a corpsman, his Creole/French language skills led him to interpret for Haitian sailors while in the US Navy in Korea. He may have been the only sailor carrying a sewing machine in his duffle bag! Fellow sailors asked him to alter their uniforms, and when they found out his talents, wives requested dresses. Due to his small stature, his commanders thought he would do well dealing with psychiatric cases, and true to his upbringing, was assigned to nursery duties.

After his navy service, he enrolled in the Berkeley School of Arts and Crafts. In 1956 he met his wife JoAnne. After a fascinating courtship, got married and moved to Pasadena, California. His love story is a must hear. Ask him! He and his wife had 5 children. After he lost his wife, he adopted 3 more. They came into his life when his kids brought them home. Because of his large house and heart, he took them in. His family consists of 4 boys and 4 girls, all married. He is blessed with 18 grand kids and 9 great grands.

For 15 years, he designed for large clothing companies. He designed both daytime and evening clothing, as well as freelanceing designer hand bags and shoes. He made custom



hats for private clients. "Jack Bryan Designs By Du Puis" were designed in the 1960s and 1970s and are still being sold in vintage shops over the internet today.

After he retired in 1999, he moved to Yellville, Arkansas where his sisters



lived. He started quilting in 2014 with a group in Yellville. And in 2015 joined Hill 'N Hollow Quilters Guild. Until recently, he had been the only

male quilter. Now we have 4 men quilting with us.

Dick considers himself "charmed." No matter what he wanted to do, he found a way. No matter what interest, assignment in his career, or partner in life, he found a way to create and be happy. He has always felt comfortable doing whatever he found interesting. "There is no sex in the arts. I am a cook, I crochet, knit, paint, pottery, porcelain dolls, sew, and now I quilt. I also do woodworking, tile work, wallpaper, garden, and housework. There is no sex to all of these."

He urged any guy to try quilting. because it is creative, relaxing, and the finished product is so rewarding. Quilting will find you. Peggy Moody and Dick Du Puis
