I am calling for quilts with the theme of "Why Join a Quilt Guild." We will feature our educational activities. I would like quilts that show off the following benefits:

Beginning Classes (like Carol Lewis with Quilt Along, and past classes from Vicki and Sharon)

Members Teaching Members Classes (from past years--could be Dresdens, Hawaiian, panels, miniature, paper piecing etc.)

Programs (like panels, Modern, Applique', Indigenous, "Every Quilt Tells a Story", even trunk shows like Mary's "What Was I Thinking?")

Workshops (like picture quilts, barn blocks, panel perfection, borders, etc.)

Challenges (Temperature, Chicken, Seasons, bags, aprons etc.)



Member Bio:

Marion Bogden was born in Germany and married a US Army soldier in 1989. Three years later, they moved to Oregon and 5 years ago moved to Arkansas "to retire and relax" and so that she could earn the right to say "y'all." They have 2 sons, one studying to be a Physician's Associate, and the other working on his MBA at Baptist University in Texas. Both grandparents worked in spinning mills, and her mother is a Women's Tailor. Marion learned from mother to sew at age 6 on a treadle machine. She went on to get her degree in Textile Engineering and Production. While sons were growing and taking care of disabled husband (Gulf War), she made her first quilt. Finding fabric in Germany and Oregon proved challenging.

Marion is a creative person! She has raised chickens, chopped wood, knitted socks aplenty, fabric design and dyeing, and has a fabric addiction that got her to our guild last December 2023. Interesting tidbit, she sewed diapers from repurposed sweaters and sold them as "wool soakers." She's completed 63 quilts, and we have been lucky to see some of her designs at guild Show and Tell. Currently she is on a deadline making a wedding quilt for her eldest son.



Marion joined our guild just this January after attending the December meeting where she saw our 40th Anniversary President's Program. She claims that encouragement from members after seeing her quilts helped her to enter the Searcy County (Marshall) Quilt Show this past month. She was astonished and thrilled to win a Second Place award. She had the unfortunate experience of having someone tell her quilts weren't show worthy back in Oregon. Well, not here sister.

She has many quilting goals: one quilt/month; using up one stash before buying new fabric; using bright hand-dyed with Amish black; and possible hand sewing after she was required to attach a hanging sleeve for her quilt entries. She offers some good tips for beginning quilters—there are NO quilt police. Listen to what folks have to offer, then don't listen to it. Run with your ideas. If it makes you happy, do it. "The ultimate compliment in my book is not what a show-judge says about your quilt, but how the recipient of that quilt cherishes it. And

Conquer Triangles!

If you can sew squares and triangles together with a scant $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam and without distorting the pieces you're sewing together, you have conquered machine piecing!

Triangles can be tricky: all those bias edges get out of shape so easily. But you can tame the bias and learn to sew triangles together accurately. A little practice will make this skill become (relatively) easy. I'll share what I know in the next Members Teaching Members (MTM) class,

"Beginning Quilting: Triangles." This full-day class will meet from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, May 18, at The Christian Church of Mountain Home. Yes, you will need your sewing machine, and there's a little homework before the class meets. As with the Squares and Rectangles class, we will be making a placemat featuring triangles in addition to some triangle units that are not part of the placemat. I will emphasize techniques that do not require any special rulers or other equipment, although I'll show you some special rulers that can really help with accurate cutting and trimming.



You should be able to finish the placemat during class, but there won't be time to layer and quilt it.

Registration will close after the next guild meeting on May 10. It takes five students to make the class go, and only one has registered so far.
