Summertime is a great time to learn new skills and capitalize on the knowledge of your fellow guild members. And summer 2024 features four Members Teaching Members (MTM) classes.

On Thursday, June 20, Peggy Moody is teaching a half-day class on Needle-Turn Appliqué from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. If you'd like to experience slow stitching, this is a great technique to learn. She's following it up with another half-day class from 1 to 5 p.m. If you have admired her fabulous Hawaiian Appliqué quilts, this is your chance to begin making your own. The fee for each class is \$10.

Mary Jo Smith is continuing the appliqué theme on Thursday, July 18, with a class on Beginning Wool Appliqué. Her wool appliqué is stunning, as I'm sure you have noticed, and you'll learn some of her secrets in this class, which runs from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The fee is \$10 plus a kit fee of \$5.

If you're looking to make points in your piecing sharp and accurate, Darlene Landrum's Beginning Paper Piecing is the class for you. It will run from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 17, and the fee is \$20.

All classes are held at The Christian Church of Mountain Home (where our guild meetings take place). Remember: you must be a guild member to take these classes. It takes five students to make a class go, and there are no fee refunds unless the guild cancels the class (you can, however, find someone to take your place).
